



Home Learning – Frequently asked questions

I haven't been able to log into Tapestry, what should I do?

It's really important that you can log into Tapestry as your child's teacher has shared a weekly timetable and activities. Contact the school office to update your email and we can resend an activation email to you.

Can other parents see observations added to Tapestry?

No. Only class teachers can see these posts. We love seeing what the children have been up to. Class teachers are able to comment and like posts you have uploaded.

I don't have a printer so my child can't take part in the White Rose lessons.

You don't need to print out any resources for your child. The resources can be viewed on a laptop/tablet/phone. Every child was given an exercise book to work in. Follow the lesson and use the exercise book to complete the work.

I have 3 children sharing one laptop. How can we access online learning?

We understand this can be a challenge. Younger children do not need a device to learn from. The early years team have been sharing lots of practical activities that you can complete with items you'll find around the house.

When working with older children you could utilise the BBC Bitesize lessons, these can be found by pressing the red button on your remote control and don't require a device. Children can complete the activity using the exercise book sent home.

I'm finding it difficult to get my child to work from 9am until 3pm.

Don't worry, home learning is very different to learning in school. Class teachers have set three daily activities for children to complete each day. Follow the timetable whilst continuing to ensure your child reads for 15 – 20 minutes each day. Keep active with Move it Monday, Joe Wicks or Cosmic Yoga.

We've been doing lots of activities like baking, crafts and gardening.

Brilliant! Your children will learn so much from practical activities. It's amazing how much Maths and Science we do when baking. Keep uploading these activities onto Tapestry!

I'm trying to complete home learning activities and working from home.

We understand this is challenging and something we haven't had to do before. Don't be too hard on yourself! Try setting a timetable of when you will work from home and when you're able to help with home learning. Remember, children spend time working independently whilst in school as well as working with an adult.

Try using the BBC bitesize lessons, these can be found online, by pressing the red button on your TV remote control or on BBC catch up on your TV. The lessons are delivered by primary school teachers, children can watch and join in.
